## **NM Food & Agriculture Policy Council 2025 Legislative Priorities as of January 27, 2025**

### **Supporting food, farm, hunger and health legislative initiatives**

#### **NM Grown for Seniors: \$1.5 million (HB2)**

Aging & Long-Term service Department (ALTSD) special request included on the FY26 increase to the Kiki Saavedra Senior Dignity Fund. Currently 177 of the state's 240 senior centers are purchasing NM grown and raised foods. Funding would allow the ALTSD to expand the program to all senior centers and provide more funds for buying local.

#### **NM Grown for K-12: \$2.3 million (HB2 - recurring)**

Public Education Department (PED). 67 out of 89 School Food Authorities are purchasing New Mexico grown and raised food serving more than 300,000 New Mexico students in school meal programs. This is in alignment with the Healthy Universal School Meals program.

#### **Approved Supplier Program Market Development, Value Chain Coordination, and Related Technical Assistance Support for Farmers, Ranchers, and Food Businesses: \$430,000**

(HB2 - special in Executive, not in LFC) NM Department of Agriculture (NMDA)

The Approved Supplier Program is the state's food quality assurance program essential to NM Grown procurement. It connects farmers, ranchers, and producers to institutions such as food banks, childcare centers, and senior centers. Benefiting more than 300 producers statewide, sales for FY26 are projected at \$7.5 million, with continued growth expected in FY27 and beyond.

#### **Healthy Universal School Meals:**

NM Public Education Department (PED), HB2

Already in the PED budget is \$41 million annually. Statutorily required.

#### **\$9.7 million recurring increase, \$5 million special, \$7.8 million supplemental, and**

**\$3 million deficiency funding requests** will fully fund implementation of the healthy hunger free students' bill of rights act, 22-13C-1 NMSA 1978.

#### **Brighter Bites: Enhanced reimbursements for excellence in Childcare meal Quality:**

**\$1 million, HB2**

Early Childhood Education Fund (ECECD) incentivizes the adoption of higher meal standards – including scratch cooking and locally sourced ingredients – in childcare settings statewide. The Brighter Meals program integrates with the State's FOCUS Quality Rating Improvement System and ties improved meal standards to measurable quality benchmarks for childcare providers leading to higher quality meals for approximately 10,000 children.

#### **WIC and Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program: \$1 million (HB2 - recurring)**

Department of Health (DOH). This funding will support expanding farmers' market nutrition program incentives to more than 23,162 individuals through the Senior and WIC Farmers' Market Nutrition Program. Over 555 individual farmers benefit from this program.

**Healthy Food Financing Fund: \$2+ million, HB2**

Economic Development Department (EDD). This grant program serves as the cornerstone to a developing suite of financial tools and technical assistance for food and agricultural enterprises to grow, raise, process, aggregate, distribute, and sell local, fresh, healthy food through expanded retail and institutional in-state market channels in rural and underserved communities. Program expansion will support the creation of more than 70 new jobs, with a demonstrated track record of 75 jobs created since the inception of the program.

**Emergency Assistance for Food Banks: \$10 million, (HB2 - supplemental)**

Health Care Authority (HCA) would fund critical infrastructure including – mobile grocery units, cold storage, and refrigerated transportation – and emergency food for communities statewide. including “farm to food bank” programs, (\$30 million over three years).

**Food is Medicine: Medicaid Funded Nutrition Prescription and Medically Tailored Meals**

**\$40.5 million** for food for the Health Care Authority (HCA). This program will support nutrition interventions for more than 3,000 homebound seniors and 2,400 pregnant individuals. Interventions include medically tailored meals, fruit and vegetable prescriptions, protein box prescriptions, and healthy food vouchers. HB2

**Support for College Students Struggling with Basic Needs: \$4 million**

Higher Education Department (HED), HB2

The program will provide grab and go healthy meals, low-cost or free access to campus dining meal plans, and/or innovations to food distribution systems that support up to 15,500 food insecure students.

**Agriculture, Water Resilience Program: \$10 Million, (HB2 - special)**

(NMDA) in support of regionally appropriate projects that improve farmers and ranchers’ ability to manage, conserve, and efficiently apply limited water resources for agriculture production.

**Agriculture Water Resilience Coordinator (NMDA): \$175,000 (HB2 - recurring)**

An expert with agricultural background is needed to accomplish state actions outlined in the Governor’s 50 Year Water Plan and support agricultural participation in regional water planning under the Water Security Planning Act.

**Acequia and Community Ditch Fund Needs (NMDA): \$417,711 (HB2 - recurring)**

The demands on this fund, available to the state’s 14 active associations, continually exceed available monies – typically by a factor of nearly two. The requested amount would bring this fund to \$1,250,000.

**Aquifer Monitoring Program: \$28.8 million, NM Tech - Higher Education Budget), HB2**

**NM Pollinator Program: \$1.5 million over 3 years**

(NM Dept. of Fish & Game or Natural Resources in collaboration with NMDA) for personnel, research, outreach and education program.

**Veterinary Repayment Loan Program: \$5 million**

**Bill Number: HB90**

**Sponsors:** Representatives Gail Armstrong and Martin Zamora, and Senator Pat Woods

**New Mexico County & Tribal Health Councils: \$43 million**

(DOH): Support the NM Alliance of Health Councils advocating for recurring optimal funding to leverage County & Tribal Health Councils for success in service of communities statewide. Health Councils are the lifeline for New Mexicans and a critical function of public health.

**Public Banking Act: \$50 million**

HB130, sponsored by Representative Caballero.

The Public Banking Act will establish a State Public Bank to improve the state's focus, efficiency, and effectiveness in the management of its funds. The public bank's mission is to collaborate with community banks, credit unions and local governments to increase social capital, expand infrastructure, and regenerate natural assets. Among these investments would be regenerative agriculture, expanding production and processing, and protecting water resources and the environment.
